Malaria Sunday is a powerful way to mobilize your church to join the war on malaria, a leading killer of the world's children. This special program is designed to be part of your Sunday morning service. On Malaria Sunday your church will join with other churches across the United States to fight malaria and help save the lives of children Jesus loves.

ABOUT MALARIA



Malaria is one of history's oldest and most prevalent killers. Although it was eradicated in the United States 60 years ago, it is still a leading cause of death for children around the world.

- Malaria is caused by a bite from a parasite-infected mosquito
- In 2010, 655,000 people died of malaria, 596,000 of them in Africa
- 86% of all malaria deaths are children younger than 5
- In Africa, more than 1,500 children younger than 5—or one child about every 60 seconds—die from malaria each day
- Insecticide-treated bed nets are a powerful weapon in the fight against malaria, which is a preventable and treatable disease
- Malaria has a significant economic impact, costing Africa's economy an estimated \$3 billion to \$12 billion in lost productivity each year
- But progress is being made, with malaria deaths falling 25% since 2000

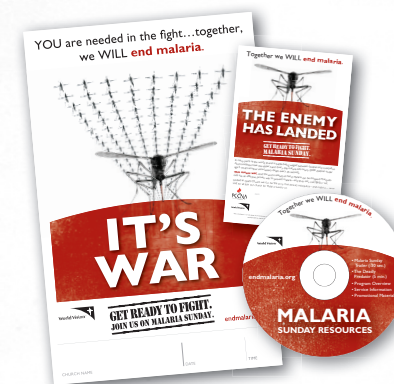

THREE EASY STEPS TO JOIN THE WAR ON MALARIA

1 PREPARE:

3 EVENT DAY:

- Choose music and scriptures that communicate God's commitment to justice for the poor.
- Use your sermon to inspire your people to join the fight against malaria.
